At our age, we can hide our own Easter Eggs, wait half an hour, and have no clue where we left them. P.B.S.

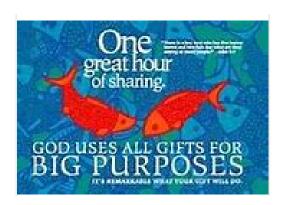
### One Great Hour of Sharing

#### DO NOT BE AFRAID

Our Lord and our Bible tell us hundreds of times to "Fear not". And we've all heard the saying "Let your faith be bigger than your fear". I was watching Dr. Charles Stanley on TV this morning. His emphasis today was "Don't let your fear override your faith". Sounds good, sounds logical, sounds simple enough. It's certainly nothing new to those of us who claim to be Christians. But I think that we, like Peter, when he walked on water for that brief moment in time, tend to lose our focus after a little while. How CAN we focus on our faith, when the stench of fear is all around us?

We are bombarded incessantly with words and phrases like "death, pandemic, coronavirus, lack of surgical masks, no toilet paper, no bottled water, no antiseptic soap or wipes, no diapers for babies, stay six feet away, wash your hands", just to mention a few. The press and the media feed our fear 24 hours a day. We are constantly being reminded that we can't go certain places, we can't do certain things, we can't get every little thing we want at the grocery store every time. But saddest of all I think, is that we can no longer go visit our old people in assisted-living facilities, our family and friends who are hospitalized, and we can't worship God together on Sunday.



I understand the need to stay informed and aware of the enemy that is attacking the world right now. It makes sense that when we're informed, and try to work within the guidelines that have been set out for us by our world leaders and health officials, that we stand a much better chance of surviving this crisis. I get it. I really do

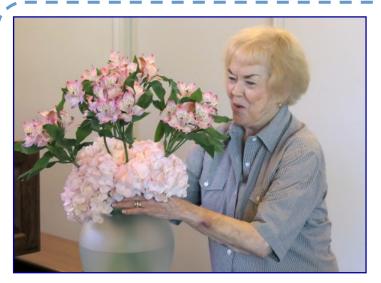
But personally, I do not watch or listen to the news. I have not read a newspaper in the last few weeks. I do not listen to every TV news person who wants to tell me how horrible he or she thinks my life and your life is at this time, or what percentage he thinks my chances of survival are at my age. No thanks. I do not need all that negativity surrounding me.

My family and friends keep me informed of anything they think I might need to know. Yes, I'm trying to follow the guidelines set out for us. Yes I'm washing my hands all the time. Yes I use hand sanitizer. And yes, I have sequestered myself in my home, mostly because I am recovering from hip surgery.

But these are the most important things I'm doing. I am exercising to try and get this new hip in shape, reading a lot of books, various things, scripture, inspirational stories, listening to the TBN, and some of my favorite music on KLOVE. I can't speak for everyone. But personally, I need positive energy. I need cards and letters and phone calls and texts and emails from my friends and family. I needed the lovely flower arrangement that I received from some friends at church last week. I needed that delicious dinner that some friends dropped off one evening. I needed those phone calls asking how I'm doing. And I need to reach out by text or email or phone call to my friends and family to inquire about their health and safety and to say "I love you and I'm praying for you".

But I think what I need most of all is the reminder that I am a child of God. My life and times are in his hands. Hebrews 9:27 tells us that "And as it is appointed once for man to die, and after that the judgment." Death is not to be feared. It is an appointment that must be kept. It is an appointment made for us by The Lord God Almighty. And he is the only one who knows the date and time and circumstance. (Romans 15:13) "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope".
