Carl's Comments - Reverend Carl Thompson

As I was cleaning up my computer's hard drive, deleting old things I had written, I came across this article I wrote over 8 years ago. As I read it, I thought, "Things haven't changed. In fact, I think Christian education is even more important today." With all the events going on in our nation today, I think religious education, with an understanding of Christian ethics and morality, is even more



important. Because of this I want Pete to use what I found as my comments in the newsletter this month. It begins below:

When faced with tragedy, fear, or a life changing event or decision, have you ever pondered the value of your religious upbringing? Has your relationship with God carried you through some anxious or even devastating moments in your life?

Americans claim to be a highly religious people with 92 percent of Americans professing belief in God (or a universal spirit). That belief does not seem to translate into knowledge of their own faith. A Pew Research Center poll reveals how little Americans know about religion.

This knowledge gap has real-world consequences, including a lack of the ability to evaluate religious claims from politicians or religious groups, a shallow view of world events, and a weakened capacity to critique the claims of those preaching religious intolerance and hate. Closing the religious knowledge gap is an important step in lessening these problems.



Consider these words by John Adams, our second president, who also served as chairman of the American Bible Society. In an address to military leaders he said, 'We have no government armed with the power capable of contending with human passions, unbridled by morality and true religion. Our constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other.'

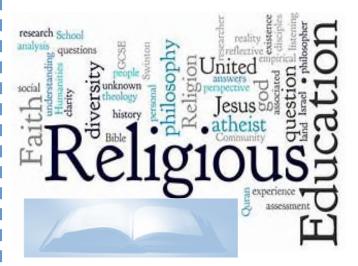

The title of the study is <u>Covenant</u>, and both the readings and discussions will focus on how the Covenant relationship between God and His people is woven throughout the entire Bible.



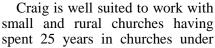
