My Grandad - Linda Lloyd

My Grandad, Swart Taylor Johnston, was a tall man with a big belly, and a jolly laugh. He was raised in the country, but migrated to the city in search of work. He and my Grandma Valdie were raising a family of four, and finding a paying job was not easy back then.

Grandad will be remembered for many things. But these are some that my family and I talk about most when we're together.

He loved to sit in the backyard swing, cradling one of his grandchildren, and singing "How much is that doggie in the window?" And heaven help the neighbor passing by, because Grandad would hail them and have some joke to tell them.

One of his favorites was about a dog and some gasoline. "Mrs. Patterson," he'd say, "Did you hear about the neighbor's dog?" "No Mr. Johnston. What happened to him?" "Well", Grandad would say, "He drank a whole can of gasoline, ran around the house five times, and just dropped over." "Oh my goodness", Mrs. Patterson would reply. "Did he die?" Grandad's response? "No. He just ran out of gas." And he would chuckle for five minutes after she walked down the road.

When we'd go to visit his or Grandma's families, he'd wave at every farmer sitting on his front porch, and yell "Hey Jake." If I turned to look out the back window, the poor man would likely be scratching his head and looking confused, probably wondering who Jake was. And every cemetery we passed, Granddad would say, "You know, people are just dying to get in there."

My grandparents were never late for anything, especially not for church. If we weren't there at least an hour before the janitor arrived to open the doors of the church, Grandad thought we were late.

Our neighbors must have hated Sunday mornings. Every Sunday was the same. Granddad would put on his suit, don his Stetson hat, warm up the Chevy, and sit out in front of our house waiting for Grandma and I to come out to the car.

Since the two of us were not in any hurry, especially on a winter morning, to go sit in a cold, empty church, we took our time getting ready. About every 10 minutes or so, Grandad would honk the horn about three times.

I guess the lesson must have stuck with me. If you happen to enter the choir room on Sunday morning about ten minutes before ten, you will likely hear me saying, "We have to go. We're going to be late." That very thing happened this past Sunday, which prompted me to write this story.

I could tell you so many things about Grandad. But I think the two most important ones would be these. He and my Grandmother chose to raise me. They didn't have to do

it. And they took me to church every Sunday. They put me in children's choir and sent me to church camp one summer. They gave me the most precious gift, a love of God. And for that, I could never thank them enough.

Leviticus 19:3: Everyone of you shall revere his mother and his father, and you shall keep the Sabbaths: I am the Lord your God.
