# August 2021 Benevolence Report

Since the Fall term for school districts will begin soon, our congregation is 'on board' for the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual **PROJECT BACKPACK** distribution of school supplies by Salado Family Relief. On August 10 and 12, from 5 to 7 PM, in the parking lot of our church, volunteers will provide appropriate backpacks and specified grade-level supply kits to its clients with children in the Salado schools. Social distancing guidelines used in 2020 will be observed again, allowing families to remain in their cars to receive the supplies.

Salado Family Relief started this community project in 2009 and has been able to continue due to the generosity of individuals, businesses, and churches in Salado. In 2020, 194 students in the SISD received backpacks and supplies, and a larger participation is expected this year. The cost of supplies has also increased.

# Seventeen Members to Study Summer Bible Lessons



Members and friends of our congregation have been gathering in our church's classroom at Noon each Thursday since July 1<sup>st</sup>, and they will complete the nine-lesson study on August 29<sup>th</sup>. There are 17 members participating either in the class or at home. In July, the lessons presented the Old Testament stories of three women considered ancestral "grandmothers" of Jesus, namely Tamar, Rahab, and Ruth. All of them are listed in Matthew's genealogy in the New Testment among the traditional male ancestors and all are now recognized as having a significant role in the Israelite heredity from Abraham to Jesus.

In August, the lessons will look ahead to the New Testament story of Mary, the Mother of Jesus. A common theme connects the nine lessons: How God can work through ordinary people, empowering them with his steadfast love. Ultimately, the story of Mary brings God's Son, Jesus Christ, into our world to save humanity. Today's Christians are also challenged by the lessons to practice love toward all people, respecting and helping those who are in need and less fortunate than we are. Pat Rehm

### When God Calls Us

Ralph and I have been traveling for the last couple of weeks. It started out simply enough. It was just supposed to be a trip from Texas to Pennsylvania to take my dad home. Enroute, we stopped in Tyler for an evening to visit my daughter Dawn and her family. My Dad hadn't seen his newest great-great-granddaughter. It was a sweet time.

When we arrived in Pennsylvania, we went to visit two of my aunts. They are both in facilities and they both have dementia. One was just admitted, and my cousin was struggling with the decision. She needed some reassurance that she was doing the right thing. It was heartbreaking to visit the aunts. But I have this deep need to hug them and tell them how much I love them, even if they don't understand.

Next, we stopped in Ohio to visit my cousin Jayne Ann. Her husband passed away recently, and she is alone now. She needed somebody to listen to her talk about her husband and to share in her grief over his passing. Her daughters don't live close by, you see.

We then wended our way through Indiana, taking the northern route to avoid all the bad weather further south. We soon found ourselves in Arkansas, visiting with Ralph's nephew and his family. Dean Cody, the nephew, is facing some serious surgeries at some point. He and his wife have three little girls and are having a rough time since he can't work. So, a dinner out and a little "back to school" shopping seemed to be in order. The girls had a lot of fun making their selections and can't wait to wear them to school. We took pictures and shared lots of hugs.

A phone call then brought us to Enid, Oklahoma. My friend's daughter has had to admit her mom to a facility this week. Again, a bad case of dementia, and yet again, the daughter is struggling with the decision. Her brother and sister are not close by. Her father is dead. So, she reached out to me. I've known her most of her life. And she knows that Ralph and I will be there for her whenever she needs us. So, for the last couple of days, Ralph has been replacing dishwashers, repairing gates, and moving things to storage, in preparation to sell my friend's house. I have been helping in any way that I can.

It's been nice seeing the grandchildren and having a meal with people we've met here. But it has been so hard for me to see my friend sitting in a chair with a baby doll in her lap and talking gibberish. I have shed so many tears these last two weeks. Sometimes I feel like they will never stop.

And then a text from my grade school friend with the news that her husband's dementia has gotten so bad that he is being admitted to a facility. They are in California so it's unlikely that I will get there anytime soon. But oh, how I want to hug her and tell her how much my heart aches for her and "our Teddy," our childhood name for her husband. I said as much to her in a text since she has no time for phone calls.

Now, I know and believe in my heart that each one of these "calls" is a call from God. But sometimes I feel like Jonah. I just want to run away. I feel so inadequate to the task. And I just must wonder "why" Almighty God would send me. What qualifications could I possibly have? But then I am reminded of the following scriptures:

(Galatians 6:2) Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ.

(Philippians 4:13) I can do all things through Christ, who gives me strength.

Jim completed his degree in electrical engineering at the University of Texas before taking a job at the Texas Power and Light Company.


