




# New Members Knox and Betsy Tyson



On January 21st, Knox and Betsy joined our church via reaffirmation of faith. Both have been active in Worship and Sunday School, plus Betsy has joined the choir and participates in yoga.

### **MEET THE TYSONS**

Betsy and Knox Tyson married in Dallas, Texas April 10, 1993. Knox was a Houston boy that had his career in Dallas. Betsy was a Dallas girl.

Betsy was a Real Estate agent in Dallas specializing in the sales and leasing of homes in the Park Cities area and in the leasing and management of commercial properties throughout the metropolitan Dallas area.

Knox was an attorney in Dallas specializing in Corporate law, Real Estate, Insurance defense and personal injury law. They were both longtime survivors of divorce. Betsy had been single for 14 years and Knox was in the singles world for 13 years before their paths crossed and lightning struck.

Both wanted to get out of Dallas and into a better lifestyle. Many small towns in Texas were visited and checked out on weekends. In 1997, they started a small business together in Temple. The small business would be the means of escape from Dallas. This was a check cashing business for unbanked people. They also sold very low-cost money orders and paid

utility bills for customers. The first store was in Temple and was doing great after 30 days. A second store was opened in Waco. Then in 1999 they purchased two stores in Killeen and opened another in Copperas Cove.

They gratefully moved to Salado in August of 2000 on the day that the temperature hit 115°F. A sixth store was added in 2003. Living in Salado allowed them to properly manage their stores and 25 employees.

In 2005 Knox received an unsolicited offer to sell all 6 stores for cash. They accepted the offer and retired in March 2005. In 2006, Betsy's oldest daughter Tracey, her husband John and daughter May moved to Salado to manage the bakery, Roy T's, the last small business started by Betsy and Knox. The bakery closed in 2012 due to the freeway construction and the loss of traffic into Salado. However, Tracey earned a certificate in Yoga and she teaches classes in the Salado area including some held in the Salado Presbyterian Church activity room.

Life in Salado - the trees, fresh air, friendly people, no traffic, plenty of room, a beautiful creek -taken altogether - has made life good for these two. The local Police Report seems

to be highlighted by problems filled with barking dogs and deer. They consider themselves fortunate.

Knox and Betsy thank all of you for welcoming them into the congregation! They will provide the worship center flowers each Sunday in February in honor of God's Love.

# "Queen Esther's Circle"

I'm writing this on Sunday, January 28, 2018, in memory of my Grandma, Valdie Johnston, who, with the help of her husband Swart, raised me till I turned eighteen years old. She would have been 117 years old today. "Happy Birthday Grandma."

I could tell you so many stories about my Grandma. But I'm thinking of one in particular today. She and my Grandad grew up on farms out in the country. They raised four children, two boys and two girls, during "The Great Depression." When work became scarce, and money even scarcer, they were forced to move "into town," where my Grandad went to work in a factory.

But they never forgot their roots. Every possible weekend, we went to the "home place," to the house that my Grandma grew up in, and where her brother Alva, still lived and was raising his own family. Then we'd mosey on down the road to visit her other brother, Arteamus, and his wife. Later on, we would stop by to see my Grandad's brothers, Jack and Jimmie, who lived nearby.

We would pass through all the little country towns with what I thought were strange sounding names, like Sycamore, Nineveh, Claysville, and Beulah, where we would attend Grandma's "home church," if some special occasion presented itself.

The church at Beulah had a ladies group, which met once a month, to eat a little, study a little, pray a little, and, in my child's mind, to gossip a lot. (As I got a little



older, I realized that what I thought was gossip, was simply the ladies sharing their burdens with each other). Each lady took a turn hosting the group, and providing refreshments. Even after my Grandma moved to town, and found a new church, she remained a member of that group. They called themselves the "Oueen Esther's Circle."

I am now, and have for about the last five years, been teaching a ladies' Bible study. Originally, we met at the Presbyterian Church in Killeen, but now we meet in my home once a month. It's a small group, only six ladies in total. At the moment, we are studying about "Queen Esther," which is what prompted me to write this.



You are probably all familiar with Esther's story. If you've forgotten it, I hope you will refresh your memory. The whole book will probably only take you ten minutes to read. It can, of course, be found in the Old Testament, right after Nehemiah, and just before Job.

The surprising thing about this book, to me, is the fact that it is only ten pages long, and has only six chapters, but it has such a powerful message. You can learn so much about faithfulness, yours and God's, trust, and doing the right thing, no matter what. And it has everything you could ask for in a good book. There is intrigue, danger, treachery, betrayal, an evil minion, royalty, a good guy, and a heroine. What more could you want?

And I love this book, because even though God is barely mentioned, you can see His handiwork running through its entirety, and know without a doubt that it was His providence, and "the hand of the Potter," that made it all turn out just the way it was supposed to. The Jews were saved from certain death, and the good guys won. That's my kind of story.

I teach a Bible study once a month. We eat a little, study a little, pray a little, and probably, gossip a lot. (We call it sharing.")

I think I will call it the "Queen Esther's Circle."




