Carol Shuck - March 15, 1951 - June 20, 2019

Carol went to be with the Lord suddenly on June 20 after a relatively short illness. This has come as a shock to many in the congregation. The Presbyterian Church of Salado will greatly miss their co-choir director.



Carol was born March 15, 1951 in Mason, Michigan to Helen and Lloyd Curtis. She grew up helping her parents and two older brothers, Colin and Kirk, on the family dairy farm. An avid reader throughout her life, Carol graduated Dansville High School at the top of her class, delivering the valedictory speech in 1969.

She attended Michigan State University, graduating with a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice in 1972. Here her love of the Spartans only grew and she was able to attend both the '88 and '14 Rose Bowl Championship football games among countless other football, and men's and women's basketball games.

Carol met her devoted husband of 46 years, Monte Shuck, on the MSU campus and they married October 14, 1972.

She went on to become the first female police officer in the city of Bloomington, Indiana; she had a long, dedicated, and varied working life that included Medical Equipment and Education Service in Livonia, MI; secretary to the maintenance supervisor at Wyeth Labs in Mason, MI for 15 years; an insurance adjustor for a company in Okemos, MI; a secretarial position at ADCO (auto parts supplier) in Michigan Center, MI; and eventually retired after 10 years as a case worker from the State of Michigan's Department of Child and Adult Foster Care.

Carol and Monte made their home in Dansville, Michigan for 35 years. She was an ardent Dansville Aggie supporter—attending a variety of sporting events, creating sup-

Carol was a proud mother to Jovon and Casey, two more Spartans, generous mother-in-law to Sheila and Sarah, and loving grandmother to Hannah and Elliot. She also leaves behind her brothers and their wives, Kirk and Mary Curtis, and Colin and Melody Curtis; her beloved nephews Charlie, Shannon, Nathan, Johnathan, and Ben Curtis; and an array of cherished family and friends.

In May 2013, Carol and Monte moved to Texas. She spent a great deal of time researching and building her dream home in Jarrell where she was a member of the Spears Ranch Ladies Book Club and the Jarrell Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). Together they joined the Presbyterian Church of Salado. A lifelong lover of music, Carol became the Music Director and a faithful choir member.

Carol was in her element when she was able to plan something—including events, trips, parties, projects, and menus. She loved finding the perfect recipe, the perfect poem or piece of music, or the perfect gift for the occasion.



Among Carol and Monte's adventures together, they were able to explore many locations, sometimes on a Goldwing motorcycle, sometimes a tandem bicycle; they took their children on multiple trips throughout the US; took their grandchildren on a houseboat adventure; and enjoyed trips through Italy, France, and most recently voyaged on the Rhine from Amsterdam, Netherlands, through Germany, and into Switzerland.




We regret that Rev. Craig Krueger, our guest from Presbytery, was not able to visit on June 30th.

"Love Carved in Stone: A Fresh Look at the Ten Commandments" will meet at Noon on eight Thursdays this summer, July 11 through August 29. We shalt follow the same routine as last year, meeting after chair yoga and allowing a 30-minute lunch break before starting the Bible study. The group is open to all members and friends of our congregation on any dates that they can attend.

The author is Eugenia Anne Gamble, a pastor for more than 30 years, who approaches the Ten Commandments as "Ten Words of Love" from God to His people. She emphasizes *God's interaction with the Israelites* in the way he delivered them – as *Words*, speaking directly to Moses, but also engraving



them on tablets for His people to see. Each lesson explores the biblical background of specific commandments and relates them to the Christian perspective of God's grace through Jesus Christ.

Sixteen books have been received and distributed, some to those who wish simply to read the lessons and others to those who intend to come to the group meeting. Personnel/Building Report

Based on Carl's comments to the congregation, the search committee has been disbanded because we are no longer searching for a Carl replacement.

A new air conditioning system has been installed to supply the needs of the Sunday school room and the Sanctuary air handler units had clogged filters and all those have been changed.

Toilets need to be flushed regularly, not just on Sundays. The paper dries out and clogs the lines. All of them were working Sunday PM.

The Benevolence Committee met in June to distribute \$7,000 to mission-related agencies. Each quarter the committee members have the privilege of sharing about 25 percent of the congregation's gifts with eight benevolent projects in Texas and elsewhere.

This summer Salado Family Relief will repeat its Project Backpack and school supplies distribution to local children and teens, again using our church's activity room on August 13th & 15th. The committee assigned \$2,000 to this annual ecumenical project in our community. Other recipients of our quarterly gifts included the Body of Christ Medical & Dental Clinics, the Children's Special Needs Network, Fisher House at Fort Hood, the Heart and Hands' Bread Ministry, Presbyterian Children's Homes, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, and Solar Under the Sun (a PCUSA project).

Your generosity not only helps people of various ages to live better, but your gifts also spread the Good News of God's love and grace through Jesus Christ. Thank you!







