


#### Carl continued:

Dr. Robert Leon Volle, Sr. 1930 ~ 2021 (age 90)

Bob Volle of Avon CT, passed away from natural causes on February 3, 2021. He lived a wonderful and productive 90 years. Born in 1930 into a French immigrant family that worked the coal mines of western Pennsylvania, Dr. Volle put himself through college at West Virginia Wesleyan College and later, completed his PhD at the University of Kansas.

In 1952 he met, fell in love with and married Adva Jean Runnels . They had five children and lived in Gulfport, MS; Lawrence, KS; New Orleans LA (twice); Swarthmore and Berwyn, PA; Avon, CT (3 times); and Salado, TX.

He was a teacher, a research scientist, and an administrator at the University of Pennsylvania, Tulane University, the University of Connecticut, the University of Kentucky and West Virginia University as Vice President and Provost.

As a member of the founding faculty of the University of Connecticut School of Medicine he led the Pharmacology Department and then became Associate Dean of the Medical School.

He left the teaching profession to take on the role of President and CEO, and then President Emeritus, of the National Board of Medical Examiners.

Active in his church, he taught classes on various religious topics at the churches in his local communities and met wonderful, endearing friends while doing so. Bob loved his pets, especially Terri, Katie, Emma and Annie and he rescued many four-legged friends throughout his retirement. He was passionate about researching his family roots.

While he thrived in academia, he was most proud of his love for and devotion to his wife of 68 years, Adva, and their children. Along with his wife, he leaves behind his daughter, L. Michelle Volle Borden, grandsons, Zachary and Bradley; his son, Robert Leon Volle Jr., his wife Beth, grand children Catherine and David; son, Rev. Dr. J. Stephen Volle; daughter Dr. Lisa M. Volle, granddaughter, Sara, great grandchildren Athena and Atlas; and son John M. Volle, his wife Maria, grandchildren Alyssa and Robert, and great grandson, Chase.

# An Update from the Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services

Our mission report this month features a denominational agency which our congregation has continued to support with benevolence funds each quarter during the COVID-19 Pandemic. It features a recent email on February 26, 2021, from Reagan Stone, our Austin representative and a Senior Development Officer at PCHAS.



"This year has been tough for many children and families in the care of Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services. With the ongoing pandemic and the devastating winter storm, our families, who were already struggling, need help now more than ever.

All of our clients are safe after last week's events. Staff have arranged temporary relocation for those whose homes are currently unsafe. Case managers have checked in on our non-residential clients to ensure they are safe as well. Some PCHAS staff have taken to sitting in their cars to find the power and warmth to make these critical calls to families.

Here are just a few of the very real challenges our PCHAS family faces today:

- The electricity is out on our Waxahachie, TX campus. Some families left to stay with friends in the community, and the others moved to the Bridge House, which has a fireplace that clients and staff are using to stay warm. One of the cottages had a ceiling pipe burst which will soon be repaired.
- Electricity was out in our Itasca, TX Foster Care Village, but it has now been restored. One cottage on this campus has an upstairs pipe that burst causing some water damage.
- A ceiling pipe burst in our transitional living home in Columbia, MO which has caused water damage in parts of the building. Our Columbia friends know this was particularly disappointing for all involved as the home was recently renovated and redecorated to



welcome back its residential clients. We have temporarily moved all of the young women we serve in this program while repairs are made.

While many hardships continue, PCHAS responds to community needs and those continue as well. Therefore, PCHAS is expanding and opening new programs throughout the state.

- Temple Texas will soon have a new therapeutic mentoring program. The program will link community mentors and youth in middle and high school working on communication and problem solving skills as well as strengthening their future outcomes with tutoring and financial planning.
- The San Antonio campus expansion is almost complete! The campus will now host 16 single parent families and their children. These families will have free counseling, mentoring for their kids, and a safe, loving duplex to stay while regaining their footing in the community. The campus will also house up to 6 transitional youth, those young adults who recently aged out of a foster home.



Please pray for all the children and families in our care that we may continue to ensure they stay warm, safe and comforted. Pray that parents stay calm and strong during this crisis. Pray for our staff who are challenged to care for their own families as well as their clients. And pray for our communities, that we may grow closer to our neighbors as we persevere together.

We had shut off the water at the street before we left and put our frozen meat in a box on the patio so we arrived home to no damage. God is good! Pat and Mike Hart

Had power & managed to venture out and bring Amy & Brady plus 2 big dogs and 4 guinea pigs to their home for 5 days.

#### Letta Meinen

Her retirement home had power so her son came to live with her for several days.

### Sara and John Pettijohn

Since John was still getting over his surgery and was somewhat anemic. 41degrees in the house was not going to work. They tried the Stage Coach Inn and Holiday Inn before both lost power. Then they went all the way to Austin closely following a semi. Their daughter never did loose power and had hot food and showers.



So, what was this winter storm about: first a paralyzing ice storm with lots of sleet on Thursday, 2/18, followed by a snowstorm (6 inches) on Sunday,2/21, night with extreme cold (2 degrees) Monday and 6 degrees Tuesday, then another ice storm Wednesday, 2/24, morning. So, we had ice, snow, and more ice with record breaking lows.

Trish and I had 79.5 continuous hours with no power. It went off at 5:03 AM Monday and did not come back on until 12:30 Thursday afternoon. It was in the forties in our bath and bedroom, but the propane fireplace kept the living room around 60. It just felt COLD - as it went on hour after hour!

We began synchronizing our schedule with daylight. With little light, other than four candles, the fireplace, and flashlights, plus no TV or radio, there was no reason we should not go to bed by at least 8 o'clock. <u>It was dark!</u> Getting up was tough, with stormy skies and temperatures in the single digits, a bedroom in the 40's, no chance for a hot shower, a cold breakfast, and no hot coffee; it was an easy decision to stay in the cozy/warm bed until mid-morning.

Trish was still recovering from the spiral break of the femur. The metal plate seemed to get colder but did no damage.

And we could not leave the house, driving was impossible, plus where would we gothe grocery, motels and most businesses were also out of power or lacked personnel. (We heard that at one point the closest available warm motel room would be in Austin or Waco.) We ended up with thick ice, snow, then more ice on the snow and ice! I can understand how DEPRESSION could set in!

I had not worn long-john's for years, but they really felt good on the power outage days outside and INSIDE the house. Do not forget that Sawyer Dog needed to "go out" 4 or 5 times a day. She did not like the iced grass, but the snow was fun. However, once we had just solid ice, she had as much trouble walking, even with four-wheel (legged) drive, as I did with two. I only fell on the ice once but had a couple of other close calls. I had to "winterize up" before each trip out with Merrell boots, scarf, stocking cap, gloves, and a coat with hood.



All cell phones, DeWalt batteries, and backup chargers were about dead by Thursday AM. Power came on at noon, 2/25 - just in time.



We lost some refrigerated food but really came out very well other than a broken garage door spring. We had no frozen pipes (son in Houston had a pipe in a ceiling break in 9 places so for a while he had no power or water). If you had a water line break there are not enough plumbers or copper piping to go around to get it fix for weeks. However, everyone around here with a pool has problems - neighbors have estimated \$3500 to \$15,000 to get a pool fixed.

We have heard of some older folks freezing to death in their homes during the storm and yes, I can understand after being cold, hungry, and depressed for multiple days!

Once the power came on -70 degrees - in the house felt hot! Friday finally brought some thawing, but Saturday morning brought dangerous refreezing. Sunday was **74** degrees and all the snow and ice were gone!

The Lord has brought us through this "test" and made us stronger! Pete and Trish Stebbins
