On the Journey with Pastor Mari Lyn

Kevin and I met in the fall of our last undergraduate semester. Our friendship grew, and as the semester began to draw to a close, we shared memories of previous family holiday celebrations. He told stories about his large, extended Jones family sitting around Mamaw and Granddad's dining table each year, sharing the holiday meal together. A little over a



year later, after Kevin and my friendship had deepened into love, he brought me home for the holidays.

I would see for myself how his grandparents' simple but sturdy Ranch Oak table could expand to seat all who were invited. Walking into their home that holiday morning, I found a house filled with laughter and warm conversation. I walked into a house soon to be filled with people - 22 by the time we sat down for dinner. It was cold outside, and the wind was wild up on the caprock where Mamaw and Granddad lived. But there were logs burning in the fireplace, so it was warm and welcoming inside. The lingering scent of pies baked yesterday swirled in the dining/living area. As I had before - when I first met Kevin's family on a short weekend visit - I was greeted with smiles and hugs and, this time, an invitation to join Mamaw and Aunt Shirley in the kitchen, for a last-minute taste test of our soon-to-be dinner. As I walked by the dining table, I saw that it stretched as long as the room would accommodate it. And, yes, there were 22 chairs around that single table. Mamaw and



Granddad's table really did open up to receive all who came to share their meal.

When I recall Mamaw and Granddad's table, I think of the Lord's Table and the feast Jesus the Christ sets there. We call this feast "Communion" because at his table, we <u>come together</u> with Jesus. We call this meal "the Lord's Supper" because it

was at supper on that night he was betrayed, that Jesus declared a new covenant. As he blessed, broke, and gave bread to his disciples and as he poured wine, he commanded them then - and us now - to remember him. We call this feast "the Eucharist" (eucharist is Greek for "thanksgiving") because in this meal, we give thanks for the gift of Jesus' love and grace, for his saving death and resurrection, and for the promise of his return.

Mamaw and Granddad's ever-expanding table reminds me that in his practice of eating with "sinners" as well as with Pharisees, Jesus makes room for everyone who comes to his table. The warm welcome I always received from Mamaw and Granddad - hugs and smiles - reminds me of Jesus'

ever-expanding welcome to anyone who seeks to know him, welcome to anyone who wants to love him. When I remember Mamaw and Grandad's table, I think of family and the comfort, encouragement, and healing that a sense of belonging bestows on those who know they are a member of a loving family.

I give thanks - not only around the Thanksgiving holiday but year-round - for the expansive love, the warm welcome, and the certainty of belonging Jesus offers us each time we gather at his table and share the feast he has prepared.

We stayed with Eddie and his wife Beth. We celebrated Pat's and my birthdays with a yummy cake from Costco's, watched the amazing "Eclipse" from their driveway, visited with two of our nieces, and enjoyed a wonderful family time together. We returned home on Sunday night.

On Wednesday morning we drove out to Goldthwaite, to spend a couple of days in the country with my youngest daughter, Kristin, whose husband works in Louisiana. We know that she gets lonely out there with just the dog and the horses for company. And she likes to pamper me on



my birthday. Another birthday cake! I will probably have to diet when I get back home.

We left Goldthwaite last Friday morning, and traveled to Enid, Oklahoma, about a six-hour journey. I was sure glad to get out of that car. We used to come here to visit my precious friend Dorothy. Sadly, she passed away last year. So, whenever we get a chance, or whenever her daughter Alison calls me, Ralph and I do our best to come to Oklahoma.

After the children's sermon, about 6 of them took the first offering, which was for an after-school program. As fate would have it (what I call a God incidence) a lady from the church just happened to run into a young man who had been a part of that program years ago. The young man, Dylan, gave a tearful and touching "Minute for Mission" about what the program had meant to him.

The service ended with a parting hymn, of "God be with you till we meet again."

I was discouraged to see such a small gathering in that beautiful church. But at the same time, I was encouraged to see that they had some children participating. And I made it a point to speak to the pastor after the service and tell her how good it was to see a young person ministering there.

This morning we are headed to Durant for a few days of rest and relaxation, just the two of us. We're hoping to watch the Rangers and the Astros battle it out. And barring any unforeseen circumstances, we hope to worship with you next Sunday.

Presbyterian Church of Salado - Summary of Session Meeting 10/15/23 Respectfully submitted by Patricia Rehm, Clerk

The meeting was started at 11:08 AM in the classroom by Rev. budget for 2024. Both were discussed, minor changes were Mari Lyn Jones, and Randy Kemp led the devotion and opening prayer. All ruling elders were present, and Quorum was declared. Pat Rehm called for approval of two sets of recent minutes, for August 20, and October 8 and both were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Pat Hart stated that the September offerings were \$4476, and expenses were over \$10,000 which leaves a negative balance for the month of more than \$5,000.

Old Business

Remaining Fellowship events: It was decided to have the usual meal with decorations after worship on October 29th in Fellowship Hall, but on November 19th during the Greening of the Church to keep the soup and sandwiches in the kitchen for workers and let them eat in the kitchen or classroom,.

The proposed **purchase of a projector** to match the church's new laptop: Randy Kemp has consulted two vendors regarding the possible configuration of a projection system for presentations in the sanctuary. He will meet with each one at the church this coming week. Pete Stebbins reported information on standalone projectors that can be moved from room to room as needed. Rev. Jones asked Pete and Randy to confer and make a recommendation for a new projector/projector system at the next stated session meeting.

New Business - Proposed 2024 Budget: Treasurer Pat Hart presented a forecast for the remainder of 2023 and a proposed made, and both will be presented at the congregational meeting on November 5th. Pledge forms will be distributed on that day as well. After pledges are returned, a finalized budget will be voted on at the next session meeting in December.

Report from Nominating Committee: Debby Aldridge, Personnel/Finance Elder, reported for the 2023 Nominating Committee. They met on September 21, 2023, and prepared a slate of nominations for the class of 2026. The committee will meet again this week to finalize the nominations and will present two Session members and a new nominating committee for your consideration at the Nov. 5, Congregational Meeting.

Pastor's Report: The Rev. Mari Lyn Jones reported Pastoral Care visits (including Communion to homebound parishioners) and conversations with friends and members of the congregation. She also shared positive reception to the two sermon series she has preached, as well as future worship plans. She suggested additional advertising for and verified some information about our annual Christmas Eve worship service. She also reported that she will take her 1st week of vacation from Nov. 16 through Nov. 23. The Rev. Jesse Thornton will fill the pulpit Nov. 19.

The Congregational Meeting will be on Nov. 5th, and next Session meeting is set for December 17, 2023.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer at 1:16 PM.
