On the Journey with Pastor Mari Lyn

I've been thinking about the Sacrament of Communion lately and reflecting on how it has shaped my faith journey so far. As a possible conversation starter, I will share here one of my experiences with Communion. Perhaps reading it, you will be encouraged to share a rec-



ollection of Communion with me at one of our Conversations and Connections.**

I grew up in the church. As a young child, I attended Sunday School and morning and evening worship services with my family. When I started 4th grade, I also began to attend mid-week Mission and Bible study weekly. As a teenager, I added Sunday evening Youth Fellowship to this weekly schedule. But when I left home to attend college, things changed. Overwhelmed by the number of students on UT Austin campus and the population of Austin, I felt like a tiny fish swimming among too many other creatures in a vast ocean. Even in the churches nearby, it seemed impossible to make my place among all the other students in the Sunday School classes and to carve my niche in the worship services. By my sophomore year in college, church activities no longer had a place on my calendar.

Then ... mid-morning one Sunday as I was brushing my teeth in one of the shared bathrooms of the women's dormitory where I lived, 2 of my hallmates walked in. With notes of surprise in their voices they said, "Mari Lyn, what are you doing here? You'll be late for church." I replied, "I don't go to church anymore." They looked at each other, then turned to me, "Well, in that case, you can come to Folk Mass with us this evening at the Catholic Student Center." It was less an invitation than a command. But these young women were part of a group of 10 Pharmacy students who had transferred together from UT Pan American in the Valley. All of them had been kind and friendly with everyone in our dormitory. So, I agreed to join their group attending Folk Mass that evening.

Later, as we walked together across the UT campus, I told them I had never attended a Catholic Mass. "The only thing I know about Mass is I am not supposed to take Communion since I am not Catholic," I said. All together, they stopped walking. Turning to me,

one of them replied, "Mari Lyn, you need Communion." friends were right. I needed Communion. Everyone around the group nodded and continued, "We'll show you what to do and when to do it." "We'll tell you what words to say, and when to say them." "It will be okay. You will be able to participate." When we entered the sanctuary where the Folk Mass was celebrated, my hallmates surrounded me. Some sat in front of me, some behind me, some beside me. In front of me, I had visual cues for when to stand or sit or kneel. Behind me, I had audible cues for when and what to sing and say. When the priest gave an invitation to come forward and receive Communion—whispering, my friends on either side of me explained what everyone was doing and why.

As it turned out, these hallmates who became my friends were right. I did need Communion. I needed the community of Christ to surround me with love and grace. And they did. I needed the community of Christ to show me the way back to the God who runs to welcome the prodigal daughter home with open arms. And they did. I needed the community of Christ to feed me with the word of God (Scripture) so that I might re-encounter the Word of God (Jesus). And they did. My hallmates-turned-

For the remainder of that school year, I was nourished spiritually in Sunday evening Folk Mass, in Wednesday Mid-day Prayer, and in daily meals and conversations with my Catholic hallmates-turned-friends. am so grateful that these young women invited **me** to join the feast that Christ sets for all who seek him, the feast that Christ shares with all who want to love him. I am so thankful that these devout young women continued that fellowship beyond Christ's table. For they helped me find my way back home to Jesus the Christ.

How can we—who are the Presbyterian Church of Salado—show our acquaintances, neighbors, and friends the way "back home" to the God who creates us, the Christ who redeems us, and the Spirit who sustains us?

If you've never visited the Norman Rockwell Museum and workshop, in Stockbridge, Massachusetts, you might want to put it on your bucket list. It is said to be one of the most popular museums in the world. And I highly recommend it

It's probably been 15 years since Ralph and I visited there. We were on a "bucket list" trip of mine, to visit some New England states, including Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, Connecticut, and Vermont, when the fall (and falling) leaves were at the height of their glory. Since childhood, I had longed to visit New England in Autumn. I have a birthday in October, so it seemed to be the perfect time for such a trip.

I remember that day like it was yesterday. We were traveling with some friends, a couple from our church. Earlier that morning, we had picked up some sandwiches and some drinks from a Subway shop close to our hotel.

Invitation to Celebrate World Communion Sunday - Oct. 1, 2023

The first Sunday of October is designated World Communion Sunday. On this day, Christian congregations around the world celebrate the Sacrament of Communion together. On World Communion Sunday, we lift up the unity of the body of Christ—our oneness in Christ—even as we celebrate the diversity among us—the uniqueness in which God has created each of us.

World Communion Sunday is October 1 this year. You are invited to join our World Communion Sunday celebration in the following ways:

- Wear an item of clothing or bring something from another country or culture. Many of us have received gifts purchased during our own or friends' or families' travels outside the United States. These items and/ or clothes will give us visual reminders that our Christian siblings around the world are celebrating Communion with us on this day.
- Bring a word of greetings ("welcome," "hello," or "good morning") from another country or culture. Many of us learned other languages in high school or college,
 - and some of us remember how to greet others using that language. (I admit it: I had to check Google to remember how to offer greetings in Italian.) You'll have an opportunity at the beginning of worship to

say your word(s) of greeting and to tell us from what country or culture that word comes. (I had some greetings from other countries/cultures that people could volunteer to read, so if anyone wants to volunteer, contact me if you forget to "do your homework.") These words will be an **audible** reminder that our Christian siblings around the world are celebrating Communion with us.

During the Choral Call to Worship, help bring (process) the elements of Communion (bread and

juice) and the tableware (chalice, plate, pitcher) to the Communion Table. This movement reminds us that Christ's invitation to come to his table draws forth a **response**

4. Invite a friend or neighbor to come with you to worship with us this World Communion Sunday. Please include in your invitation that we Presbyterians believe all are welcome at Christ's table.
