
conclusion, should we spend our time? What is really important?

Sam Lanham fell on Friday, 8/23, and needed six stiches. He is still sore but nothing was broken. Pray for healing and stability.


Anniversaries this week - Joan and Chine Ray, 59; Trish and Pete Stebbins, 53. They have been blessed!

Adult Study Resumes - 9/8

On Sunday mornings, we meet as God's people and hear Holy Scripture read. When Carl says, "This is the Word of the Lord," we respond by saying "Thanks be to God." This practice bears witness to the church's belief that in reading scripture, we encounter God's own voice.

We invite you to join us in Bible study this year. We will read from every book in the Bible, Old and New Testaments, to hear God's Word to us. We will consider the Bible's literary qualities, as well as its reflection of the realities of ancient communities. We will also open our hearts to what the Holy Spirit says to us today through the Bible's message.



The title of our study is <u>Covenant</u>. It is divided into three eight-week sub-topics:

- 1. Creating the Covenant
- 2. Living the Covenant
- 3. Trusting the Covenant

The idea of <u>Covenant</u> is emphasized as a unifying pattern through all the books of the Bible and illustrates the unique relationship God chooses with us as His people. Benevolence Committee Report

Our congregation continues to support the Heart and Hands Ministries with personal donations for its pantry and clothing shop, as well as making bread purchases from mission funds twice a month. The Benevolence Committee will disburse the 3rd quarter mission funds in mid-September.



The Back-to-School Program of Salado Family Relief highlighted local mission activities last month, distributing backpacks and school supplies on August 13 and 15 in our building. *Project Backpack 2019* raised over \$7,900 in our community to help with the purchase of the backpacks and supplies - an amount greater than any collected in previous years. The largest donation of funds came from the partnering churches in Salado – Presbyterian Church of Salado, Grace Church, Church of Christ, United Methodist Church, and St. Joseph's Episcopal. Several area residents and businesses also contributed, and for the first time this year, donations could be made at area restaurants in collection jars.
