On the Journey with Pastor Mari Lyn

Reading Matthew 2: 1 - 12 in preparation for this Sunday's sermon—the last in our On the Way to Bethlehem sermon series—I am thinking about stargazing.

In one of my favorite movies, "The Lion King," three characters are stargazing. Timon the meercat, Pumba the warthog, and Simba the lion are lying on the ground, looking up at the night sky. They



wonder aloud what "those sparkling dots are up there." Timon says they are fireflies that somehow "got stuck up in that bluish-black thing." Pumba disagrees, "I always thought they were balls of gas burning billions of miles away." And Simba, the Lion King to-be says, "Somebody once told me that the great kings of the past were up there watching over us."

My first and best memories of stargazing are with Kevin—whose description of his summer internship at McDonald Observatory (along with his long, wild-looking hair)



first attracted me to him. In the first years of our marriage, when we would travel from Austin to Snyder, Kevin would point out constellations such as Orion's Belt (in the winter) or Scorpius (in the summer). Driving in the dark, on deserted roads, heading west, away from the Austin light pollution, I had my first look at the Milky Way galaxy and the many other stars in the night sky.

Stargazing—looking at the stars, pondering their distance from us, wondering whether they are still burning when their light finally reaches the earth—

stargazing reminds me how vast the universe is and emphasizes the omniscience, the providence, and the power of the One who created it all.

Matthew 2: 1 - 12 begins with Stargazers—not amateurs like Timon, Pumba, and Simba; not even pseudo

professionals like Kevin with his astronomy degree. This story begins with professional Stargazers—scholars who studied both the stars and the ancient writings that correlated natural phenomena with prophecy. These professional Stargazers notice a new, different star in the night sky. Researching ancient writings, they conclude it heralds the birth of a new Jewish king.

Some of them stay where they are—content with collecting the data, researching the writings, and drawing a conclusion. But some of these scholar-stargazers are moved by the portent of this new star. They are physically moved, for they journey to the land of the Jews to lay their eyes on this new king.

I wonder whether we—like these ancient Stargazers—will study God's creation in this new year. Will we be awed by its beauty and grandeur: watching the sun be fully eclipsed by the moon (April 8) and gazing at the stars in the clear night sky? If so, I wonder whether

we—like these ancient Stargazers—will see or hear, taste or touch, smell or intuit a sign from God as we study God's creation and as we study God's scriptures in this new year. In so doing, will we, like the magi in Matthew 2: 1 – 12, be moved to seek out a personal experience with God's Word—Jesus the Christ? Or will we stay where we are,

content with what we already know, satisfied with what we already have experienced?

I hope our 2024 stargazing leads us to wonder with reverence, drawing us closer to the God who creates us, the Christ who redeems us, and the Holy Spirit who sustains us.

Sharing in Christ's Service, *Jeanette West*

Presbyterian Church of Salado - Summary of Session Meeting (Dec. 17, 2023) Respectfully submitted by Patricia Rehm, Clerk

The meeting was started at 11:12 AM by Rev. Mari Lyn Jones. Pat Hart led the devotion and opening prayer. All ruling elders were present, as well as the three newly elected elders: Randy Kemp (2023), Debby Aldridge (2025), Mike Hart (2024), Sharon VanWinkle (2024), Jeanette West (2024), Denice Kemp (2026), Chris Gengler (2026), and Evelyn Matthews (2024). Clerk Pat Rehm called for acceptance of two sets of previous meeting minutes, Oct. 15 and Nov.5, and both were approved.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - Pat Hart stated that there was a deficit of about \$900 for the month of November, as expenses are running ahead of income from offerings. Depending on receipts during the month of December, we may need to move some funds from the savings account to meet expenses.

<u>Old Business</u> - Randy Kemp reported that obtaining new projection equipment for funerals and 5th Sunday presentations would require a major expenditure.

Pat Hart presented modifications to the previously proposed budget based on the 2024 pledges received from the congregation. Since expenses in the Building and Grounds, Salaries, and Advertising categories are not negotiable, cuts had to be made in other financial areas, resulting in totals of \$103,640 in income and \$101,795 in expenses for the new budget. The 2023 Annual Report from the Session will be distributed at the Congregational Meeting on January 28, 2024.

<u>New Business</u> - Rev. Mari Lyn Jones had recently met with the new elders and had officially examined them for readiness to become ruling elders in our congregation. She welcomed them and asked each to share why they are willing to serve in this leadership role.

Rev. Jones said that the *PC Salado 2013 Manual of Operations* has the current committee requirements, and that restructuring is possible. "Fellowship" could be renamed "Congregational Care," to include the oversight of bereavement meals and persons on the caring prayer list.

Decisions regarding who will chair the 2024 Committees and who will be Clerk of Session will be made at the next Session meeting, January 21st. The ordination/installation of newly-elected elders will take place on Jan.7, 2024, during worship.

The **Annual Congregational meeting** will be held on January 28, 2024. All 2023 Committee chairs will speak briefly about their written reports, and 2024 Committee chairs will describe their committees' activities and invite the congregation to consider working with them.

In 2024, we will celebrate Communion on the first Sunday of each month, as well as Maundy Thursday.

The Director of the **Salado Family Relief Fund**, J. R. Lett, would like to use part of Room 35 as a small storage area and place shelving along the "hallway wall" for boxes of Empty Bowl items.

A projector for future presentations at the church has been presented by Sarah Schmidt in memory of her grandmother, Lillian 'Lilree' Jackson. Pat Hart will have a plaque made for the church, and the Clerk will send a 'thank you' note.

<u>Pastor's Report</u> - Rev. Mari Lyn Jones thanked elders for their written reports for this quarter. She would like to leave the 'Hanging of the Greens' decorations in place until the end of Epiphany. She and Session members will encourage group conversations within the congregation as an interim process after a new pastor has come.

Her written report to Session members prior to today's meeting had included information about (1) her pastoral care activities, (2)the opportunities that she has had to get better acquainted with the congregation, (3) the sermon series presented before and during Advent and Christmas, (4) plans for the special worship services on Christmas Eve and on December 31, a 5th Sunday, and (5) Down Home Ranch as a benevolence opportunity when obtaining poinsettias, to consider for next year, as it is a non-profit workplace for persons with developmental disabilities to learn and receive wages as they grow and sell red poinsettias for Christmas church services.

Committee Reports for 4th quarter activities -

Randy Kemp reported for Building and Grounds that all annual maintenance had been completed, except for the AC filters, and he will replace them this week. He said that the PA system seems fixed for the time being, but the microphones may need to be replaced. There were no significant repairs required in 2023.

Mike Hart, Benevolence elder, stated that through Nov.30, 2023, we had donated 20% of our eligible offerings. No further giving should occur this year due to the current state of our budget.

Mike also reported that a new book, *God Never Gives Up on You* by Max Lucado, will be distributed soon for class to begin on January 7.

Debby Aldridge, elder for Personnel/Finance, led the Nominating Committee to replace outgoing Session members and to select new members for their own committee. All nominees were approved as presented.


Jeanette West, elder for Worship, has coordinated Communion on the first Sunday of each month, 5th Sunday activities as needed, and pulpit supply on July 23.


